MINISTER'S FOREWORD

"The RSPCA worked with the Palaszczuk Government to frame the Dog Breeder Register."

The Queensland Government is a long-time partner of the RSPCA. Apart from an annual grant of \$500,000, this year we have pledged additional capital works grants of \$3 million over three years for upgrades to the Townsville and Cairns facilities.

We recognise that the RSPCA cannot have Inspectors in every regional area. Because of this, there is a close working relationship between the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries and the RSPCA, and DAF officers often investigate complaints made in regional areas.

The Palaszczuk Government appreciates the support it receives from the RSPCA in terms of regulatory compliance and enforcement of the Animal Care and Protection Act and in return, provides training and other assistance for RSPCA staff. The RSPCA is a recognised stakeholder in animal welfare issues and that is reflected in its membership on the Animal Welfare Advisory Board established by the Palaszczuk Government.

I look forward to continued cooperation between DAF and the RSPCA in implementing the new Dog Breeder Registration legislation aimed at destroying the working model of unethical and exploitative puppy farm operations. This is important, groundbreaking



legislation that we hope will make a real difference. Back in 2015, I announced the opening of consultation on puppy farms and the future regulation of dog breeding in Queensland. I said that there was no place in our state for cruel and unethical exploitation of dogs for profit and absolutely no place in a civilised society for puppy farms where dogs had no human interaction, no medical attention, no comforts and no exercise.

It was a long process, but I am proud to say that on 26 May 2017, new laws applying to anyone giving away, supplying, selling or advertising dogs for sale came into force. The RSPCA worked with the Palaszczuk Government to frame the Dog Breeder Register. Our joint aim is, through the register and educating the public not to buy puppies without a breeder identification number, to make it impossible for rogue breeders to operate.

OUR REPORTS



President

There are two comments people often make when they find out I'm President of RSPCA Qld. They either say, "Oh that must be wonderful! You're surrounded by all those beautiful animals!" Or they say, "That must be heartbreaking. How do you cope with all that misery?" Although there can be a bit of the latter, I explain that the good far, far outweighs the bad and there are many more happy outcomes than there are sad ones. This year of course is no exception and once again we continue to break new ground.

In the last year over 50,000 animals passed through our doors which means the numbers are rising every year. Our Inspectorate investigated over 18,000 cruelty and neglect complaints and a further 29,750 calls were made to our animal rescue network. But in many ways it has been our wildlife hospital that has been under the pump. It dealt with over 22,000 native animals and birds. To put that into perspective, five years ago, we were

dealing with around 8,500. This is very disturbing and is the direct and indirect result of habitat destruction.

I think it's fair to say we'll always try something new to achieve our aims of saving more lives. Our #Adoptabull promotion was innovative and very successful and we will look at doing it again next year. 120 bull type breeds were rehomed which was an excellent result. Similarly our Sit, Drop, Shop in Jindalee DFO has not only drawn attention to the RSPCA and what we do, it has also rehomed well over 100 cats and kittens since its inception in October last year. Our Pop Up Adoption event at the Convention Centre was also a massive success, rehoming 485 animals in one day.

Animals continue to provide comfort to humans and our Happy Paws Happy Hearts program is living proof of that as it continues to grow. In the last year, the program has delivered over 600 hours of meaningful animal interactions to members of the community at risk of social isolation. This is set to increase over the next 12 months with the arrival of the NDIS to the Ipswich region.

Our achievements are only possible through the dedication and hard work of our staff and volunteers, my sincere thanks goes to all of them. They have made 2017 another busy but very productive year.

CEO

As I'm sure most of you realise, RSPCA Qld is one organisation that would love to be made redundant! Sadly that is not about to happen any time soon. As President Tribe pointed out, our Wildlife Hospital numbers have nearly quadrupled in the last five years and our Inspectorate and Animal Rescue Unit have been busier than ever. In January, Inspectors raided a puppy farm in Glenarbor near Goondiwindi that is believed to have had links to dog fighting.

There was inadequate shelter and water and a number of the dogs were carrying injuries that needed urgent veterinary treatment. There were also the remains of a number of corpses lying near dogs that were tethered. It was a very distressing situation and a man is now facing a record 215 animal welfare related charges. Thankfully most of these animals have been successfully rehomed. And while we're on the subject of puppy farms, it was heartening to see the new puppy farm legislation finally become a reality. While we do believe it needs "tweaking" in certain areas, it is certainly a major step forward and will help stamp out irresponsible breeding and the greedy individuals who profit from it.

A very generous donor has enabled us to increase the number of Inspectors and hire a digital officer to help bring these perpetrators of mass animal cruelty to justice. Another area I'd like to touch on is the escalating success of our Work for the Dole program. The extra hands ensure all of our animals receive a higher quality of care and enrichment.



It wouldn't be a CEO report if I didn't mention finances. As you will see in the Treasurer's report, the balance sheet continues to improve. We were able to care for a record amount of animals and still have a surplus. There is no doubt it gets harder and harder every year and this year was no different. Cash flow can be an issue because of our rollercoaster income streams from the bequest area. Thanks again to an incredibly generous anonymous donor, a new facility was built on the Wacol campus for the increasingly popular sport of Flyball and this is also available for many other RSPCA activities.

Finally I'd like to mention how honoured we were to host the legendary conservationist Dr Jane Goodall who visited Wacol this year. Her visit was organised by Save the Bilby founder Frank Manthey and we'd like to thank him most sincerely. Also present on the day were two Australian legends - Dawn Fraser and Bob Irwin. Once again my sincere thanks to all of our staff and volunteers who some days seem to make the impossible look easy!

Treasurer

The 2016–2017 year was difficult from a cashflow perspective, but RSPCA Qld has posted a solid result. We achieved a small surplus of \$0.3m from revenue of \$49.4m. This compares with a surplus of \$1.8m from revenues of \$47.5m last year.

Some of the financial highlights from the fiscal year were:

- A new Animal Care Centre and council contract at Ipswich in October 2016. This has resulted in an increase in shelter related income and expense.
- Our Cairns Animal Care Centre was closed in February 2017 for major redevelopment that is due to complete in January 2018.
- Adoption income was up \$0.31m or 10% due to some fantastic Adoption Promotions and the work of our shelter teams. The total number of animals who found new homes was 18,369, an increase of 2% on the previous year.

- A new Op Shop has been opened at Stones Corner in Brisbane and it has been trading well since opening in August 2016 to provide additional funding for animals in need.
- We have received additional funding from the State Government by way of a \$500,000 grant to assist with our wildlife work, an additional \$250,000 to assist with the operational costs of our Inspectorate team and for the current year, \$55,000 to support our Pets in Crisis fostering program that helps domestic violence victims.

Unfortunately our bequests, which are a significant part of our income, were down 25% on the previous year. This was partially offset by improved donation income, related mainly to a few significant donations. Our total operating costs have risen by 7% as we continue to strive for better outcomes for our animals. For example, our vet supplies and vet services costs are up \$0.5m or 22% as we care for more domestic and wildlife animals.

As animals in our care have increased we have continued to control our costs by negotiating improved agreements with our suppliers, and our 5,000 hard working volunteers provide savings of approximately \$8.5m p.a.

Thanks to some very generous donations RSPCA has been able to continue to improve our shelter assets. We have invested:

- \$750,000 in building improvements at Wacol.
- \$253,000 at Gympie, mainly in cat condos.
- \$112,000 at Bundaberg.
- \$40,000 at Kingaroy, predominately on a solar system and improved drainage.

We have also further paid down our debt that was borrowed to fund the Wacol shelter building, now sitting at \$4.0m, leaving a net asset position at year-end of \$36.7m.

Community Adoptions

Continuing RSPCA Qld's adoption strategy, our Community Activation Team (CAT) frequently host awareness events throughout South East Queensland to engage the public and promote pets available to adopt. These community activations frequently take on new twists and a recent success was 'Pup-A-Grams'; where corporate supporters could donate to the RSPCA to receive a workplace visit with adoptables.

Our team frequently capitalize on special days to raise the RSPCA Qld profile within the community. Take Your Dog to Work in June has revitalised our Pop Up Pets and encouraged members of the public to make a donation to take an RSPCA Pop Up Pet to their workplace in place of real pets that may not be allowed on certain sites. It's a great way for added adoption exposure and is well received every year.

These activations not only raise awareness relating to all things RSPCA, but they also give our animals that attend the opportunity to flourish outside of a shelter environment and enjoy a day out. It also increases their socialisation skills and training, allowing them to become more adoptable.

Sit, Drop, Shop

In October 2016, a new concept came into fruition with an opportunity to utilise an otherwise empty retail space within Jindalee DFO. Our first Sit, Drop, Shop store opened, manned mainly by volunteers and hosting RSPCA cats and kittens up for adoption alongside merchandise for sale from RSPCA World for Pets. In under a year, over 100 cats and kittens found their second chance with retail profits supporting our services.

Through this new concept, we have been able to change the face of traditional pet stores and reach new members of the public that may not be aware of the RSPCA or pets available to adopt. We will be looking to develop the Sit, Drop, Shop model in the future by sourcing new opportunities right across the state. This way we can continue to showcase our animals and products to new audiences.



New Initiative Launch

In early 2017 RSPCA Qld launched Pets at Rest Qld, a dignified pet cremation service offering ongoing personalised support and mortuary care for the family pet. Service locations are Brisbane, Ipswich, Redland Bay, Moreton Bay, Gold Coast and Sunshine Coast.

Adoption Promotions

#adoptabull

Staffordshire Bull Terriers and Bull Arabs are the top breeds of dogs that RSPCA Qld rescues and rehomes every year. Sadly there is still a public stigma surrounding bull-type breeds, so in March we were keen to help break these negative misconceptions with a positive, new marketing campaign.

Adoptabull was a creative adoption promotion to help rehome more bull-type breeds and break negative public perceptions around dog breeds. We worked with Liquid Interactive to create quirky videos of our typical bull-type breeds in RSPCA's care. Commonly misused words associated with these dog breeds by the media and public sentiment were written on a screen. Four adoptable dogs meticulously licked away the words. The videos on social media went viral, with hundreds of adopters and owners of bull-type breeds sharing their pet's photos and amazing stories to support the promotion.

The campaign saw a 44% increase in bull-type breed adoptions during the promotion, and a flow-on effect into April. Over 1.2 million people saw the campaign on Facebook. We are proud to have been able to help these commonly misrepresented dogs and help more pets find homes. Facebook themselves have featured the success of the campaign as a case study, along with Content Management System, Sitecore.



Both cats were very young and spent time in separate foster care homes before they were ready to be desexed and able to be put up for adoption.

Sofia and her husband, Ron have fostered a range of felines including a mother and her four kittens. "We love animals, and kittens are easy to care for and of course they are very loveable."

Fostering gives pets in need a second chance away from shelter life. Sometimes pets can fall ill or come into the RSPCA in a bad way which can be tough on foster carers dealing with young animals. "Of course I would get very upset when a kitten got too sick and would have to be put to sleep. I'm getting better with coping with that."

Most carers naturally form bonds with their foster animals and it can be difficult when pets are ready to move onto their adoption journey. "We have loved all of our kittens. They all have



their individual personalities. I can't get over how quickly they get attached to you, they follow me around like children! When I've been out and they are hiding, they come running out as soon as they hear my footsteps."

"The support staff at the RSPCA are very caring, especially if a pet hasn't pulled through from illness. I can't praise them highly enough for this. If ever I've needed anything extra for the foster kittens, the RSPCA have always readily provided. I would encourage everyone to foster as the

animals appreciate anything you do for them. They soon realise you only want what's best for them, and reward you with lots of purring!"

CRUELTY & SOCIAL MEDIA

The number of people using social media continues to grow. There are some people who will post acts of animal cruelty online and these acts are then reported to us. Due to the increase in social media reporting of animal cruelty, we now have a full time Digital Intelligence Officer. Sadly when pictures circulate on social media of animal related issues, it can take some time to get to the bottom of the source and gather enough information in order to be able to investigate.

Spending time gleaning this information online reduces the workload for our team and keeps our operational inspectors attending jobs where they are needed. Ideally what we need is for members of the public to help gather the facts about images they see online and report as much information as they can; the person/page who posted the content, if the act appears to have originated in Queensland, any location information available and screenshots in case the content is deleted.

Networks such as Facebook have allowed the RSPCA to reach thousands of users to help catch animal cruelty perpetrators by seeking more information on cases. A month before Christmas, Honey the Shetland sheepdog was left to die at a local sports ground in Morayfield. We put the callout on Facebook to help find Honey's owner.

"I have spent countless hours staring at the computer conducting every search record,

or photo of Honey that may assist with the investigation," said RSPCA Qld Inspector, Sharni Statham. "Hopefully we can get the word out to anyone who may have known someone who owned a Shetland sheepdog or even saw one matching Honey's description during these years. Any information to help us track down Honey's final moments helps."


Thankfully the community responded with leads on this case. After many months of investigation, Honey's owner was found from information provided by the public and brought to justice.

Public sentiment and outrage to animal cruelty cases posted on social media is obvious. The community is calling for tougher sentences to be handed down to offenders. Who could forget how social media helped track down two young men who were charged with animal cruelty after posting their torture of a possum on Snapchat? Well in April 2017, Hunter Lawrence Jonasen found himself back in court for assaulting a man whilst on probation. RSPCA Qld Prosecutor Tracey Jackson said, "There's an undeniable correlation between people who offend against animals and people who offend against people."

Wedge-tailed Eagle

Our Animal Emergency Hotline received a call from a member of the public who had driven past an injured eagle. Volunteer Danni and Humane Advocate Officer, Louise Napoli, found a wedge-tailed eagle on the ground in someone's front yard.

Despite having a broken wing, the eagle could still run fast; making it a tricky rescue for the RSPCA team. Volunteer Danni prevented the eagle from running onto the road while Louise caught him in a net.

After seeking advice from the Brisbane RSPCA Wildlife Hospital, Danni and Louise transported the injured eagle to Currumbin Wildlife Hospital for veterinary assessment. After veterinary assessment, sadly since the eagle's wing injury was a few days old, treatment wasn't possible and unfortunately this majestic bird of prey was put to sleep. The quicker injured wildlife is noticed and reported, the better the odds are of rehabilitation.



Skippy the Roo

Skippy got into a spot of bother recently when found in an artificial pond at the Bribie Island Research Centre.

With no water in the pond, this poor kangaroo wasn't sure the best way of getting back out! Luckily the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries (DAF) were on site when they noticed Skip having difficulty and called us.

RSPCA Animal Ambulance attendee Steph headed out to help. She managed to sedate Skip and DAF helped by winching the roo out to safety. Luckily Skippy didn't have any injuries and was able to hop back off into the wild once the sedative wore off.

Edwina the Echidna

Edwina the short-beaked Echidna was picked up by the RSPCA Animal Ambulance from a Jimboomba veterinary surgery after a backhoe dug her up in a backyard.

She was transferred to our RSPCA Animal Hospital in Brisbane. After a full vet check, Edwina was given the all clear from injury or illness. Being too young to be released back into the wild, Edwina the Echidna was sent to an experienced wildlife carer until old enough to continue her journey back in the wild.

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
